Eugene Harold Gaddis age 65, passed away July 3, 2009, suddenly at his home in Tucson. Gene was born in Sioux Falls, SD, graduated from South Dakota State University in 1967, served in the US Air Force as a fighter pilot and retired in 1992 as a Lt. Col. He was a Vietnam Veteran having flown over 3000 hours in the F-100, F-104, A-7, F-5, A-10 and F-

106 airplanes during his 25 year career. He volunteered in many community outreach programs helping the less fortunate. In November 2001 he completed construction of and continued to fly his

RV-8 experimental single engine airplane and was instrumental in the construction and restoration of several aircraft projects, offering his time and talents expecting nothing in return. He is survived by his wife, Carol; children, Bethany Gaddis of Denver, CO, Timothy Gaddis of Tucson; stepchildren, Sandra Butler of Los Angeles, CA, Jesse Butler of Tucson; sister, Eileen (Dale) Heemstra of Dolton, SD; brothers, Dick Gaddis of Sioux Falls, SD, Don (Debbie) Gaddis of Crooks, SD, Dave Gaddis of Garretson, SD, and Wayne (Cindy) Gaddis of Madison, SD. 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PERSONALITIES and their PROJECTS Mel Jordan and his RV6A



Mel is another long time citizen of Tucson. In spite of the fact that he was born in Daytona Beach, Florida he has lived in Tucson since 1954. He attended Catalina High School and went on to Ls Salle University and received his graduate degree at Arizona State. After college he went to work for Texas Instruments and is now Marketing Analog Manager for that Company. Mel got his start flying while still in college when he sold his prized Sunbeam Tiger so that he could afford flying lessons, training at Mercury Aviation at what is now TIA, and soloed on Christmas eve 1970. Shortly after he got married he felt compelled to take time off for about 15 years while he raised a family, but has since logged over 650 hours flying time. He started his RV6 from a "quick build" kit and devoted some 2000 hours to it's completion. He installed a Lycoming)-360A1A and has since added fuel injection. In his instrument panel he has a Dynon solid state artificial horizon of which he is very proud. Mel had his plane painted by Frying Kolors in Riverside, California. He designed the distinctive graphics himself. His first flight was October 31, 2002 and says he has had very little trouble since. Although he enjoys a little aerobatics, he usually limits his flying to occasional formation breakfast flights and some family fun. He flies almost every weekend, and since finishing his RV he adds about 200+ hours per year to his log book. Mel has two sons both of whom fly.
